A Message From Our Council President

Fall is here. Our kids are back in school. Sunday school and Confirmation classes are underway. The last of the crops are being harvested.

This month, we celebrate the Reformation. We will be celebrating on Sunday, October 29th. Wear your red! Why? Red is the color of the Holy Spirit, as we envision the tongues of flame over the heads of those present on the day of Pentecost – as the spirit rushed in to take away their fear, and send them out to do the work, God had prepared them to do.

With Reformation Day on October 31, 2023 Protestants and Lutherans commemorate the placarding of Martin Luther's 95 propositions in 1517. Reformation Day is on the same date as Halloween but has nothing to do with it. In the USA it is common to celebrate this commemoration day of the Reformation on the following Sunday: Reformation Sunday. In Germany this is an official holiday in the evangelic parts of the country. People believe that Martin Luther placarded his thesis about church on the All Saints Church in Wittenberg in Eastern Germany. Since 1938 this city is called Lutherstadt Wittenberg, which means City of Luther.

In his 95 thesis Luther demanded a critical answering of religious questions - very close to the bible. He translated the bible from Latin into German and so made sure that everyone could read it. He did not really plan to reform the church system but his Lutheran Bible was the hour of birth for Protestants and other evangelic Christians. The Reformation took place from 1517 until 1555 and finally split the Christian church into catholic, protestant and Lutheran Christians. One of the most offensive thesis said that shrove money should be abolished because Jesus Christ brought (continued next page)

We have a huge need for volunteers in all areas of the church. We need a treasurer, a council member and council president. Many committees have been losing members due to burnout with no one new to replace them. We may need to hire an outside bookkeeper to do the books for the church if we cannot get anyone from the congregation to take on the position. Should we fail to fill the position, we'll need to have a special congregational meeting to make changes to the constitution to allow us to hire someone from the outside. This will most likely cost us more than the stipend we currently have budgeted.

We have a saying here at Mt. Zion: Many hands make light work. Unfortunately, we currently have too few hands for all of the tasks needed to run this church. Can you please find it in your hearts to share some of your time with the church?

Great things can happen at Mount Zion if we see you all in church!

Jingle Project

For the Oct/Nov/Dec guarter we selected Holy Joe's Café. Begun in 2006 by Tom Jastermsky, Founder and Executive Director, at the First Congregational Church in Wallingford, Connecticut, their mission is to send coffee to deployed military Chaplains of all faiths to enhance their ministry of presence. Today Holy Joe's Café has grown to become their own separate 501c3 non-profit. Holy Joe's is trying to keep up with the demand from Navy Chaplains for coffee as many more are being deployed onto ships to combat the record high rate of suicides. Coffee serves as a conduit for Chaplains in having conversations over a cup of coffee. Here is a quote from retired UCC Navy Chaplain Peter St. Martin on Holy Joe's support during his deployment: "Holy Joe's Café is a provider of equipment and coffee for deployed Chaplains to make coffee for service members far from home. Service members in need don't usually seek help when they need it - just like the rest of us! So allowing Chaplains to have a coffee ministry brings about conversations for troubled folk before the problems become so large that they are unmanageable. All I had to do was ask Tom for supplies and they arrived free of charge."

The spiritual renewal, the morale booster, the relationships, even the simple moment of enjoying a cup of coffee during a long shift are possible through the donations of coffee from Holy Joe's Café. Here is a link to the Associated Press article that talks about the dire

Recipe of the Month

This month's featured recipe was submitted by Shirley Burkhart. This casserole has it all! It can be baked up in your trusty 13"x9" pan. Shirley shared that this dish, which yields 12 servings, can be made for breakfast, lunch, or brunch!

Bacon Cheeseburger Casserole

INGREDIENTS:

2 lbs. ground beef
1 can (6 oz.) tomato paste
1 large onion, chopped
2 garlic cloves, minced
1 T. Worcestershire sauce

12 bacon strips, 1/2 t. salt cooked and crumbled 1/4 t. pepper

3 C. shredded cheddar cheese, Optional toppings: Dill pickle slices, thinly sliced green

8 large eggs, at room onions, slices of red onion temperature and cherry tomatoes, halved.

DIRECTIONS:

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°. In a large skillet, cook beef, onion and garlic over medium heat, crumbling beef, until meat is no longer pink and onion is tender, 10-12 minutes, drain.
- 2. Transfer to a greased 13x9 baking dish. Sprinkle with bacon and 1 cup cheddar cheese. In a large bowl, whisk together eggs, tomato paste, heavy cream, Worcestershire sauce, salt and pepper until well combined. Pour over beef mixture. Sprinkle with the remaining 2 cups cheddar cheese.
- 3. Bake, uncovered, until set and golden brown, 30-35 minutes. Let stand10 minutes before serving. Garnish with toppings as desired.
